### How will we fund our Plan?

The Corporate Plan commits the Council to spend additional money year on year. We are fortunate that we are starting from a strong point, but we still need to manage resources carefully. Our Plan Reserve by making savings over the next 4 years will be funded by:

### Little and often increases in our Council Tax -

typically 2% a year, mainly to cover inflation on our operational services

Growth of the Town - put simply, more houses = more Council Tax raised, increasing the income we have available to deliver services

**Delivering Efficiencies** - reducing our current spend without compromising the quality of our services, and investing to make ongoing savings

Increasing Fees and helping users to manage the assets they use - changing the balance between users and Council Tax payers meeting the costs of some services

## Working in **Partnership**

The Town Council delivers some of the town's services itself, and works with partners to deliver the rest.

Our staff look after the Borough Gardens, playgrounds, several playing fields, the Municipal Buildings, Cemeteries and we administer allotments.

We work with partners who deliver some of the key services that affect residents; we comment on planning applications to West Dorset DC and work with them on parking, sport, heritage, cultural and economic issues. We work with Dorset County Council on highways and traffic issues.

Community organisations are increasingly involved in providing services, either well-established organisations such as Dorchester Arts and Dorset County Museum, or new ones such as the Trust to run the Youth Centre. We aim to revitalise the town's Community Partnership and focus it on bringing a growing town closer together.

And our residents play a major role, using our facilities and attending our events, supporting the many voluntary organisations that operate in the town, or simply working, shopping and enjoying the town's diverse offer.

Our plan to focus on improving some of Dorchester's services is driven by our understanding of what has been going on in the town for the last few years and what is planned to happen next. Our summary is as follows:

 The Town's population will continue to grow - it has been growing steadily for a number of years - now 20,000 residents, up by 4,000 since 1991.

With Poundbury, Brewery Square and the Prison site an extra 3,000 residents will live in the town in 10 years time

 The Economy is strong - heavily weighted towards the public sector, which brings both risks and rewards. Private sector jobs are growing, there is negligible unemployment, and new opportunities are emerging in heritage and other sectors

 Our population is getting older - new properties are overfocused at the mid-high end of the market, young people leaving town for

university do not return, while young workers struggle to afford to live in the town

A victim of its own success -

housing is increasingly unaffordable to workers, workers increasingly commute creating traffic and parking problems, the town misses out on the extra community and economic benefits those workers could bring if they were residents. Because employment is high we don't seek to diversify the economy further, but our public sector is transforming itself and reducing employee numbers.

## **Projects we want to progress with Dorset CC**, West Dorset DC, and Other Partners

### **Traffic and Parking in the Town**

- Long term parking and traffic solutions working with DCC & WDDC to identify better solutions for worker parking to reduce town centre traffic movement and residential street parking problems
- Working with the Highway authority to improve traffic flows - supporting DCC in their implementation of new traffic lighting and junction improvements around the town centre
- Improve the pedestrianised areas in the town working with WDDC to pedestrianise lower South St and improve the area between Shire Hall and Dorset County Museum

### **Affordable Housing**

• New flats for young workers at Trinity St - a pilot project working with housing partners to try to build 20 low cost flats on a site we use for tennis courts.

- Challenging others to provide Affordable Homes
- objecting when developers claim it is not viable to deliver the local plan target of 35% on new sites

### **Heritage Tourism**

- Promoting Dorchester as a Heritage Tourism destination - helping Heritage providers and the local Tourism industry to create a shared marketing vision to promote the town to visitors
- Cultural Capital Grants grants and practical support to some of the major cultural projects happening in the town over the next 4 years
- Informal Heritage and Signage working with WDDC and DCC to fund improvements to smaller

pieces of heritage around the town, and install a new pedestrian visitor signage scheme in the town centre.

### **Young People**

- Keeping Dorchester Youth Centre operational -Supporting a new Trust to take over the Youth Centre from DCC
- Creating apprentice opportunities working with community organisations and funding partners to provide a range of 1 year apprenticeships in the town

### Setting a long term vision for the town's growth

- Identifying the town's options for long term housing growth - understanding the pressures on the planning authority to bring sites forward and options available to the town
- Developing a Neighbourhood Plan focusing on what the town feels it needs as part of its housing mix and other planning needs

## What are we aiming to do Ourselves?

- New focus on Community Development aimed at improving social cohesion, networking between groups, promoting access to the diverse range of public and community services on offer and signposting possible funding opportunities
- Changing how we do things to save money a range of projects to reduce our costs, including a borehole in the Borough Gardens, electronic mapping, and helping users to take over the facilities they use
- Delivering a wide range of Events using the
